A Look At The Future



Eleanor Roosevelt once stated, “*The future belongs to those who believe in the beauty of their dreams.*” This inspiring quote possesses great applicability to KSHA and the professions of speech-language pathology and audiology. Not only have our professions empowered individuals with communication disorders to acknowledge the benefit of self-efficacy and aspiring to achieve goals to overcome adversity, but we can acknowledge the importance of looking to the future and striving toward growth and advancement. I am eager to begin service to KSHA as President, and I am looking forward to helping KSHA maintain its commitment to support the provision of quality services to persons with communication disorders and their families. The purpose of this article is to highlight some of KSHA’s recent achievements and to identify areas of growth that will serve as the focus of KSHA’s efforts for the upcoming year.

A Look at the Present

As KSHA looks toward the future, let us first celebrate a few of the Association’s accomplishments. KSHA has experienced growth in varied domains over the course of the past year. KSHA membership has increased by six percent over the year with membership presently consisting of 1,671 members. KSHA’s adoption of a Student Membership Initiative entailing provision of membership to students at no cost, distribution of free t-shirts, presentations at universities by KSHA Executive Council members, and efforts to involve students at Convention through introduction of the *KSHA PRAXIS Bowl* resulted in noteworthy growth as student membership increased from 108 to 281 student members. In addition, KSHA experienced growth in the sense that attendance at the 2012 KSHA Convention exceeded expectations with approximately 1,280 individuals in attendance. This reflects an increase of 210 attendees from the 2011 Convention.

KSHA also awarded scholarships to students pursuing degrees in Communication Disorders and awarded Professional Development/Research Grants to members. Given the present economic conditions, KSHA members should be pleased with not only the fact that our Association remains committed to awarding monetary contributions to its members, but that KSHA continues to demonstrate financial stability through strategic investments and management.

A Vision for the Future

In order for KSHA to continue its rich tradition of professional service, we must continue our efforts to “promote and support the highest standards for professionals in Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology, provide professional development, and advocate for legislation and regulations necessary for members to provide quality care for individuals with communication disorders.” My primary focus for KSHA this year includes efforts in advocacy, updating Association policy documents, and improving communication with members. In this article, I will briefly describe goals related to advocacy and policy revision.

Advocacy

Reimbursement issues serve as one of the areas of advocacy KSHA hopes to pursue this year. In June, KSHA secured representation on the Technical Advisory Committee on Therapy Services as two members Linda Gregory and Sherry Hoza received appointments. This committee was established through KRS 205.590 and is charged with “advising the Advisory Council for Medical Assistance with

respect to the administration of the medical assistance program and in performing the function of peer review.” The Technical Advisory Committee on Therapy Services, comprised of PT, OT and SLP representatives, is working to improve the reimbursement process for therapists in rehabilitation sciences. One of the initiatives KSHA will promote this year is the designation of speech-language pathologists as qualified Medicaid providers across settings and to increase consistencies in reimbursement rates. At present, KSHA is working to establish a Reimbursement Special Committee to work under the leadership of Linda Gregory and Sherry Hoza to provide information regarding reimbursement to the Technical Advisory Committee.

In addition to advocacy on the Technical Advisory Committee on Therapy Services, KSHA will also continue its efforts to secure funding for the Salary Supplement Bill for school-based speech-language pathologists. Passed in the 2010 Regular Legislative Session, the Salary Supplement Bill acknowledges ASHA certification as equivalent to National Board Certification for Teachers and awards school-based speech-language pathologists with a \$2,000 stipend. While school districts may elect to award stipends to their employees, districts are not required to provide the \$2,000 stipend to speech-language pathologists at present as funding was not attached to the Bill. Funding was not initially attached as Kentucky utilizes a biennial budget in which budgets are adopted during even numbered years (i.e., a budget was not adopted in 2011). Due to the downward turn in the economy resulting in numerous budgetary cuts, the political climate during 2012 Regular Legislative Session did not seem conducive for advocacy for funding. Thus, advocacy to obtain funding for the Salary Supplement as a line item in the 2014 budget will serve as another primary focus for advocacy this year. Under the leadership of Past President, Doug Keefe, KSHA has been collecting needed information (e.g., number of school districts currently awarding stipend) for continued advocacy for the Salary Supplement Bill. In addition, members of KSHA’s Executive Council recently met with KSHA’s Lobbyist to further refine a plan for advocacy. KSHA’s advocacy efforts will utilize two approaches: a targeted advocacy plan through formation of a Salary Supplement Special Committee and a grassroots advocacy plan in which all members will be encouraged to advocate for the Salary Supplement Bill in their own community. Please look for more information regarding these plans in KSHA email blasts and in the next *KSHA Communicator*.

Policy Refinement

The development and adoption of a new Strategic Plan will serve as an important goal for KSHA this year. At present, plans for an Executive Council retreat are being made. At retreat, members of Executive Council will consult with an ASHA representative to develop a strategic plan outlining our Association’s goals for the next three years. Upon completion of this goal, KSHA’s Executive Council will then aim at revision of our Bylaws and Policy and Procedures documents.

Conclusion

As always, KSHA’s success will largely depend upon involvement and support from its members. While execution of our plans may be difficult, it is my hope that as a professional organization we will strive for continued refinement and improvement and that we may always see “the beauty of our dreams.”

Honors of the Kentucky-Speech-Language Hearing Association

The KSHA Honors Committee invites nominations for KSHA Honors of the Association to be awarded at the 2013 Convention in Lexington. For Honors, the individual must be a *member of KSHA* and have demonstrated “distinguished educational, profession and/or administrative activity or outstanding service to KSHA.” The Honors Committee will recommend potential recipients to the KSHA Executive Council which must approve recipients by 2/3 affirmative vote. This award is announced at the Annual Luncheon during the KSHA Convention and is typically presented by the individual who submitted the nomination.

The KSHA-ASHF Clinical Achievement Award

The KSHA-ASHF Clinical Achievement Award for 2013 will be presented to a speech-language pathologist or audiologist in Kentucky for demonstrated contributions to the advancement of knowledge in clinical practice as evidenced by significant recent accomplishment within the past six years in either area. This award is co-sponsored by the Kentucky Speech-Language-Hearing Association (KSHA) and the American Speech-Language-Hearing Foundation (ASHF). The selection from among our state nominees will be made by 2/3 vote of the KSHA Executive Council. The individual selected by KSHA will receive a certificate from ASHF in addition to being named the 2013 Kentucky Clinical Achievement Award Winner. The 2013 recipient will be Kentucky’s nominee for the ASHF’s National DiCarlo Award for Outstanding Recent Clinical Achievement. The national winner of the DiCarlo Award will receive a recognition plaque and a grant of \$2,000 to further the project(s) upon which the award is based and will be recognized at the 2013 ASHA National Convention. This award is announced at the Annual Luncheon during the KSHA Convention and is typically presented by the individual who submitted the nomination.

Criteria for Award

Our state recipient and the national DiCarlo honoree will be chosen for advancement of knowledge in clinical practice as evidenced by significant accomplishments within the past six years in the advancement of clinical service in speech-language pathology and/or audiology. Nominees are not limited to any particular type of clinical achievement or activity. Some eligible activities or accomplishments include:

- Achievement with a single client or group of clients
- Clinical service programming
- Program development
- Achievement in a state or local organization or government agency activity
- Clinical testing, research or administration

Procedures for Nomination

The Honors Committee and ASHF Board of Directors are totally dependent on the information provided in the nomination document. Thus it is important that the information submitted be as complete and accurate as possible. Nominations will be reviewed solely on the information submitted.

- The nomination should not exceed 10, single-spaced typed pages including any letters of support
- Include nominee’s name, professional title, place of employment, address and daytime telephone number
- Description of the outstanding clinical achievement (include information of when and where the specific achievement(s) took place)
- Description of the significance of the recent achievement
- Explanation of how the nominee’s actions have advanced knowledge in the area of clinical practice
- Explanation of the nominee’s role in the achievement

Certificates of Appreciation from the Kentucky-Speech-Language Hearing Association

The KSHA Honors Committee invites nominations for KSHA Certificates of Appreciation to be awarded at the 2013 Convention in Lexington. For Certificates of Appreciation, these individuals are not KSHA members or SLPs or audiologists, but typically *members of the community* who are particularly supportive of individuals with communication disorders or of the professions. News From the ASHA SEALS

On June 25, 2012, I participated in a conference call for the state State Education Advocacy Leaders (SEALs). The teleconference leaders included: Deborah Dixon, ASHA Director of School Services; Eileen Crowe, the coordinator of ASHA SEALS; Heather Bupp, ASHA Director of Ethics; and Neil Snyder, ASHA Federal Advocacy Leader, and about 15 SEALs from other states. Heather Bupp, who is an attorney, and serves as the ASHA Director of Ethics, addressed four “hot topics” on which ASHA has received an increased number of telephone calls, questions and/or complaints. The topics she discussed and the concerns being addressed included the following:

1. Use of SLPAs in the schools. Several issues have arisen in this area.
 - a. There is no separate code of ethics for SLPAs and the SLP must be responsible for supervising and guiding the SLPA, especially in areas of confidentiality, making referrals, and communication with parents. **IMPORTANT:** it is the supervising SLP’s responsibility to inform parents that an SLPA is working with their child, instead of the SLP, if that is the case.
 - b. Individual state codes of ethics need to be checked and updated to address SLPA issues. Some state codes can be very different from ASHA’s on this topic.
 - c. In some areas of the country, SLPAs cross state lines to provide services, and each state’s codes need to be consulted to see how this should be addressed and if the state codes are compliant with one another.
2. Reporting and Tracking of student reported drug abuse. This involves confidentiality issues and what specific states **REQUIRE** a service provider to report. Also, some states have laws about how much can legally be disclosed to a parent, and how much **MUST** be shared with parents.
 - a. Some SLPs are being asked to not keep a written record of such disclosures. ASHA says that the SLP needs to document **ALL** significant information, as it effects speech-language treatment.
 - b. There should be a collaborative effort among the SLP, counselor, principal and social worker to decide **WHAT** to report and to **WHOM** to report the information. Individual state laws may be very different and must be addressed during this collaboration.

3. Making referrals to other professionals, taking care to avoid conflicts of interest. Again, state codes can vary greatly on this topic. The state code of ethics for SLPs in Ohio was cited as an example of detailed requirements for public school SLPs to reduce conflicts of interest.
4. Documentation Lapses. The Ethics committee is very concerned about documentation lapses. There is a large volume of complaints related to this issue. It appears to be primarily due to the large amount of paperwork required of SLPs, while trying to maintain therapy treatment programs for all students as stated in IEPs. Some states have modified their therapy models to 3:1 monthly model. This was described by SLP SEAL from another state as in each month, three weeks of therapy and one week of everything else including: assessments, report writing, meetings, recordkeeping, collaboration meetings, team planning, etc.

Heather’s discussion led into Neil Snyder’s discussion of the subject of his current study and investigation, one that effects **EVERY** public school SLP ... **TOO MUCH PAPERWORK**, that has grown worse with the recordkeeping for Medicaid billing, in many cases. Neil Snyder stated that he has met with special education groups, a group of state superintendents, representatives from Easter Seals and others to seek cooperation and a mutual understanding of SLPs employed in public school settings. His office is currently studying this issue and will focus on administrative streamlining, PD training for administrators and attempting to streamline the paperwork, including managing IEP data and Medicaid documentation on every student. There was then some discussion of how IEP progress data, daily progress notes and information needed for Medicaid billing was handled in different states. In many cases, there are significant procedural differences even between school districts in the same state.

The issue of making up missed therapy sessions arose, which also differs from state to state. Deborah Dixon, ASHA’s Director of School Services, explained that individual school districts can set their own standards on missed therapy sessions. These links were listed for additional information:
